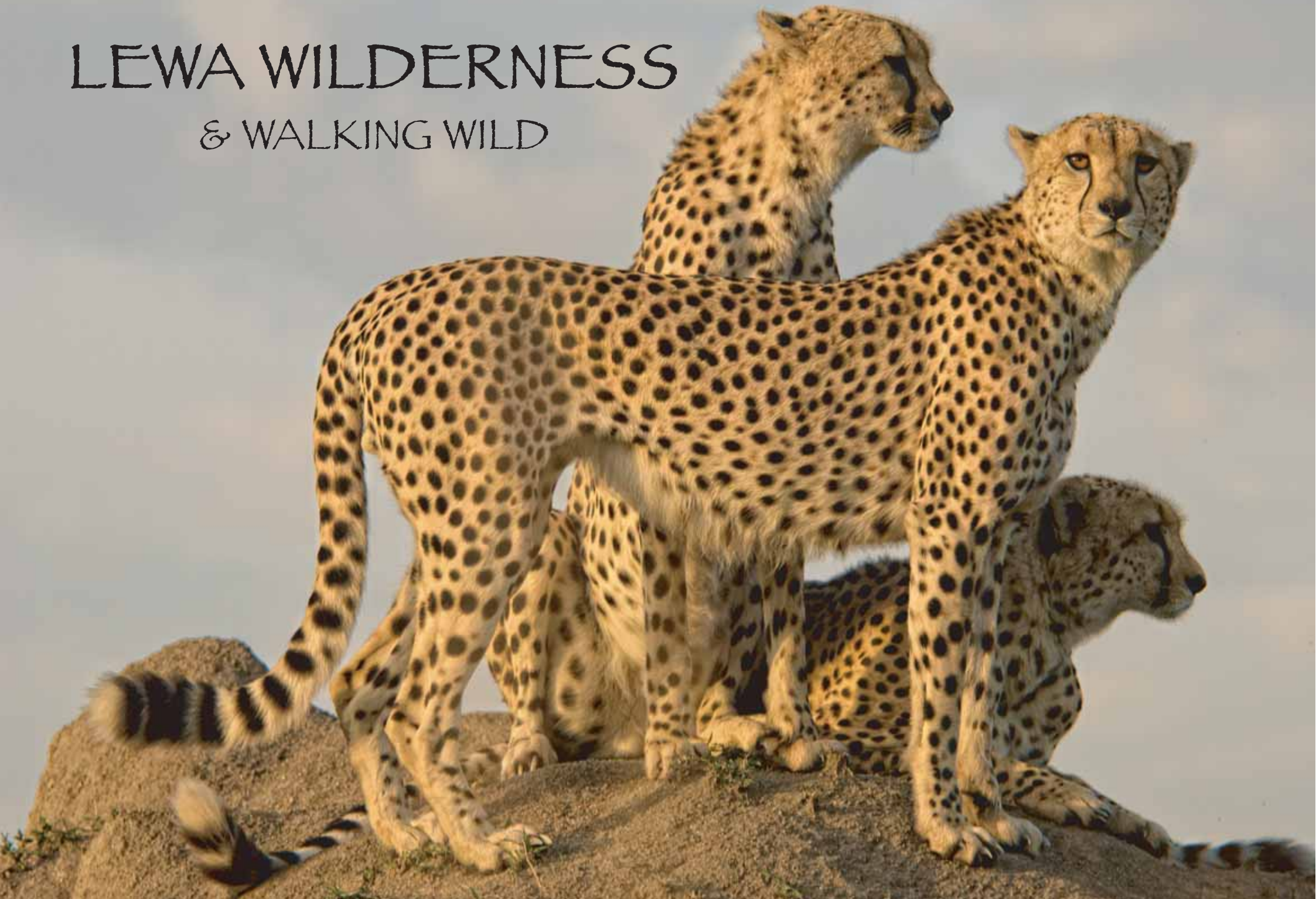



LEWA WILDERNESS & WALKING WILD





Nestled in the foothills of Mount Kenya, Lewa Wildlife Conservancy is a 62,000 acre private reserve of grasslands, acacia groves and swamps. Here, you will find wildlife in bountiful numbers, a direct result of pioneering conservation methods which are second to none. The reserve is home to endangered black rhino and Grevy's zebra, as well as large cats and an abundance of plains game.

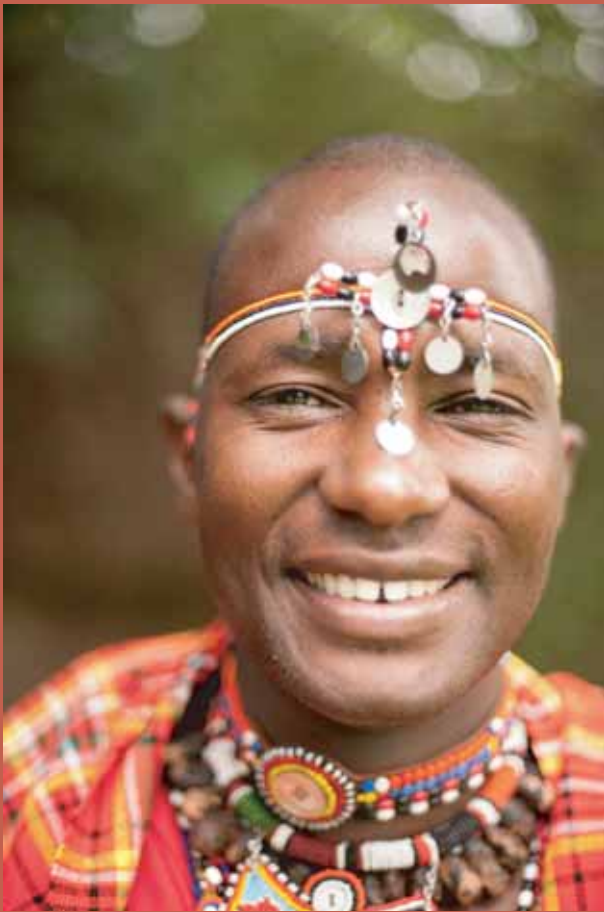

WALKING WILD is an opportunity to explore the remote valleys, hills and plains of the famous Lewa Wildlife Conservancy. The team of expert walkers will help you unlock the very best of this exceptional region.

Led by the knowledgeable Lipan Kitonga, the camp is designed to be as light weight as possible and assisted only by camels. Normal days involve an early start, after a full breakfast then breaking to pass the heat of the day under the shade of an acacia tree.

The thrill of viewing the local wildlife up close and personal, followed by a night sleeping under the African stars is an experience not to be missed.

To see, as we did, a leopard close up in broad daylight -- to watch it for nearly an hour -- is more deeply satisfying than all the museums in the world.

LEWA WILDLIFE CONSERVANCY

Conservation plays a vital role in life at Lewa Wilderness. The belief that the future of the wildlife is dependent on a commitment to conservation and the benefits which that brings to the community, is as firm today as it was in 1983 when the first parcel of land was set aside by the Craigs to form the Ngare Sergoi Rhino Sanctuary. Nearly thirty years on, the evidence of this commitment can be seen in local schools, health clinics and a dramatic increase in wildlife.
